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The commencement of several multi-million-dollar projects, the successful semesterisation of study programmes at the start of 2018 and the graduation of a record number of graduates has contributed to a year of success by Fiji National University (FNU) Vice Chancellor Professor Nigel Healey.

Professor Healey said while there are more goals the university has to strive towards, the developments that have culminated up to this year sets a solid platform for the future

"A lot of work has gone into repositioning FNU as a modern tertiary institution and I believe we are now in a firm position to make Fijians proud of FNU's role as the national university," said Professor Healey.

During the series of graduation events held in December, a total of 1, 854 students graduated from the College of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry (CAFF), National Training and Productivity Centre (NTPC), College of Business, Hospitality and Tourism Studies (CBHTS), College of Humanities and Education (CHE), College of Engineering, Science and Technology (CEST), College of Medicine Nursing and Health Sciences and FNU Labasa Campus.

This included 206 postgraduate awards (postgraduate diplomas and master's degrees).

Vice Chancellor Healey said students are returning to the University to further their education, reaffirming FNU's vision to be the leading academic and research institution in the Pacific region.

Professor Healey said the expansion in the University's postgraduate range of qualifications is important, because in today's fast-changing labour market, employees need to constantly upskill and reskill to remain productive.

"It is currently estimated that students graduating in 2018 will have 12-15 different jobs over their working lives. Many of these future jobs do not yet exist, any more then 'big data analysts' or 'social media managers' existed 10 years ago in 2008," said VC Healey.

"The key to succeeding in a changing world is continuous professional development or lifelong learning. Our increasing range of postgraduate programmes allow past graduates to return to campus to develop new specialist knowledge or, increasingly in the future, retain in new fields of study to remain relevant in the workplace."

Professor Healey while congratulating the graduates challenged them to take criticism positively.

"Succeeding in the years ahead will require you to be adaptable, open to change and be prepared to return to university from time to time to upgrade your skills and qualifications."

Professor Healey reaffirmed that as Fiji's national university, FNU was committed to providing training and education to create a highly-skilled labour force and underpin the country's rapid economic and social development.

"We at FNU are focused on developing a culture of excellence that resonates throughout our academic history."

Professor Healey also acknowledged the invaluable support of key stakeholders in the development of Fiji's

future workforce, including employers, government, public and private sector to develop study programmes.

He said since its inception in 2010, FNU has invested heavily in upgrading all its campuses, building a state-of-the-art digital infrastructure to support learning and research and developing a raft of new teaching programmes.

The following are a few important projects that FNU is undertaking in partnership with key stakeholders including the government in an effort to provide the students with better learning experience:

### Connection to AARNET

Professor Healey said this advancement has given the University an opportunity to expand and improve services in various ways.

"This submarine cable connecting the universities of Australasia with those of North America gives us superfast broadband speeds on campus and access to a range of new educational software tools."

### DigitalFIJI Initiative

The support of the Fijian Government for its DigitalFIJI initiative which has enabled students of FNU to enjoy free, unlimited access to the internet 24/7 has been acknowledged by VC Healey.

"We thank the government for making FNU a full player in the digital academic community. This digital capability has given our students the opportunity to access study portals wherever they are on campus, that is, within the geofenced range and access information from the internet."

"FNU's connection to AARNET and students having unlimited access to free internet has created opportunities to expand our blended learning provision," said Professor Healey.

### **Blended Learning**

The Office of the Pro Vice Chancellor (Learning and Teaching), led by Professor James Pounder, is working towards supporting the academic staff in enhancing their teaching and making the content accessible to students in online format.

"I passionately believe that blended learning, that is, face-to-face teaching blended with distance or online learning – is the future for tertiary education," VC Healey commented

"Moving towards greater online provision of content, combined with face-to-face tutorials and intensive block teaching in workshops and laboratories, offers a way of making tertiary education more accessible to Fijians wherever they live and whatever their circumstances," he said.

Alongside the virtual advancements, the University is also constantly upgrading the physical infrastructure of its campuses.

### Veterinary Hospital at Koronivia Campus

To further improve the teaching facilities, this year the University signed a contract for the construction of a new \$30m Veterinary Teaching Hospital.

The facility will be the first for the Pacific and it will establish Fiji as a hub for veterinary medical training in the region

"It will incorporate state-of-the-art facilities for small animals, diagnostic laboratory and post-mortem facility for small and large animals," said Professor Healey.

The project is currently at the final design stage and based on the current progress, the construction of the Hospital is expected to begin in first quarter of 2019 and should be operational by mid-2020.

Once complete, the hospital will be a dedicated teaching facility, and will also offer services to clients.

#### Four-storey building at Nasinu Campus

Another significant project that commenced this year is the four-storey College of Business, Hospitality and Tourism Studies complex.

The new multi-million-dollar building is seen as a transformational new project for Nasinu Campus.

The new building will house a dedicated Student Services Centre on the ground floor – a one-stop shop with such provisions that students can deal with enquiries on everything from enrolment to student accommodation, academic counselling and other services.

"It will have modern teaching rooms designed to facilitate flipped classroom teaching and problem-based learning," said VC Healey.

### Fiji Maritime Academy (FMA) three-storey facility

The commencement of a multi-million-dollar project at FMA will boost its reputation of being the leading maritime training institution in the region.

The \$15m government funded complex will encompass labs on ground floor including Marine High Voltage Room, Safety and Survival equipment labs, computer labs, fisheries lab and an open foyer. The upper two levels will have lecture rooms with seating capacity of up to 45 students. The project also includes construction of a car park.

VC Healey stated that providing maritime education and training requires a range of specialist facilities, hence, the steady expansion in the physical infrastructure at FMA.

### Labasa Campus construction

The \$27m new Labasa Campus is expected to be ready and operational by first semester of 2020.

This is another government-funded project which is part of its 'Look North' policy to revitalize the economy in

Phase one will include modern lecture theatres, tutorial and teaching rooms, staff administration offices, computer labs, library and a cafeteria.

The University has a \$50m year capital programme to replace old aging buildings, construction of new facilities in an effort to provide students modern studying and learning environment.

VC Healey said the focus now was on the recruitment of new students to join FNU in 2019. He urged students, parents and guardians to visit any University campus, 'pop-up service centres' or roadshows which are being undertaken to be assisted with enrolment.

"This is a very exciting period at the University as we go all out to assist students enrol in programmes they are interested in. I encourage all students to visit any of our campuses across the country or special FNU booths being set-up at strategic locations to find out more about how they can become part of the growing FNU family," said VC Healey.



# Academic wins prestigious inaugural VC's Research Excellence Award



t was a gratifying moment for Dr Rajeev Bhat to be awarded the inaugural Vice-Chancellor's Award for Research Excellence during the College of Engineering, Science and Technology (CEST) December graduation ceremony.

To promote the importance of research, this year the Office of the Pro Vice Chancellor (Research) launched the Vice Chancellor's Award for Research Excellence. The prestigious award is given to an individual researcher whose research activity has achieved considerable impact and recognition outside the University.

Dr Bhat, an Associate Professor of Food Technology and Head of Department of Food Science and Home Economics at CEST said he was honoured to be recognised for his research contributions.

The academic said such recognitions motivate researchers to work harder and sets the bar for accomplishments even higher for themselves and encourages them to contribute more to uplift the image of their departments and the organisation as a whole.

"I would like to acknowledge the Office of the Pro Vice Chancellor (Research) and the Vice Chancellor for initiating the Research Excellence award. This is a great way to showcase to the public the work of the academics in the research arena apart from normal teaching responsibilities," Dr Bhat said.

The soft-spoken Dr Bhat has more than 19 years of Research and Teaching experience in the field of agri-food technology with research expertise on various issues pertaining to 'Sustainable Food Production'.

He has gained extensive research experience by working in countries like India, South Korea, Malaysia, Germany and now in Fiji.

Dr Bhat was born and brought up in Mysore, India – the city of joy and culture! It is known for its royal heritage and magnificent buildings and monuments.

"I have always had close links with the farming community since childhood and that is when I developed the passion towards sustainable food practices." said Dr Bhatt.

"My wife also comes from a farming background in India and by observing various challenges the farmers face, my interest in assisting the farming communities boosted. We should never forget that farmers are the backbone of a nation and their contribution to any regional economy is invaluable," he said.

Dr Bhat joined the Fiji National University (FNU) in March 2016. Since then he has been focusing on bringing visibility to the Food Science Department nationally and internationally via his networks and research publications.

According to Dr Bhat, with the availability of natural resources in Fiji, there is a lot of scope in research for agri-food sector.

"Some of the innovative research activities that need to be undertaken in Fiji includes value addition for local agricultural produce, study of the impact of food processing on non-communicable diseases, evaluation of the effect of changing climate change patterns on quality and safety of foods, introducing innovative post-harvest technologies and so forth."

"Currently, there are several sustainability challenges that needs to be overcome in agri-

food technology based research in Fiji. We are working towards overcoming these challenges through contributions from our research activities," said Dr Bhat.

He is also a free-lance writer who pens his thoughts on food and health in local newspaper so that vital information reaches the local consumers.

Dr Bhat has almost 200 research publications in International Scientific Indexing (ISI) based journals and referred book chapters which were cited 6,300 times, carrying a h-index of 39 in Google scholar and 30 in Scopus database. (A h-index indicates how productive and influential a researcher is in the field.)

The 42-year-old has four edited books, 1 authored book (in press), sits on the editorial board of leading international journals and has been a scientific committee member and invited speaker at various international conferences.

Dr Bhat has successfully undertaken and completed funded research projects, as well as supervised student research projects.

He is also a recipient of prestigious international awards and recognitions, some of which includes; 'Excellence Recognition Award' conferred by the Association of Agricultural Technology in South-East Asia, 'Prosper.Net-Scopus Award in Sustainable Development' conferred by the United Nations Uni. Japan, 'IUFoST/Fi Young Scientist Excellence Award', conferred by the International Union of Food Science and Technology, Canada, Global Achievers Award conferred by the Institute of Oriental Heritage, India and Best Researcher Award 2017 from CEST, FNU.


As a special recognition he was appointed as 'Associate Fellow' at the Centre for Global Sustainability Studies (CGSS) in Malaysia.

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# Perseverance leads Dr Singh to scoop top award



umble, hard-working and friendly are few of the words that have been used to describe young academic Dr Patrick Mark Singh, winner of the inaugural recipient of Vice Chancellor's Early Career Researcher Award.

Dr Singh doesn't like to be in the limelight much, however his academic achievements have placed him in the spotlight a few times.

The most recent occasion was earlier this month during Fiji National University (FNU) College of Engineering, Science and Technology (CEST) graduation ceremony where he was announced as the winner of the VC's award.

Dr Singh said when a researcher's work is appreciated it creates great satisfaction which boosts morale and provides greater motivation to continue with their research work. After receiving the award, he thanked FNU and extended his acknowledgement to the awards panel that nominated him.

"I was very pleased and felt proud and humble at the same time when the announcement was made," said Dr Singh.

"For a moment I paused to ponder at this recognition that I have been bestowed with and realized that I still need to continue the work, I cannot stop here," he added.

The 31-year-old was recognised for achieving excellence in research as an Early Career Researcher with seven highly ranked journal papers, six best paper awards for conference papers and a H-Index of 6.

Dr Singh, who is originally from Nakasi has made contribution to knowledge in the discipline of Mechanical Engineering.

He graduated with a PhD from the Department of Mechanical Engineering at Mokpo National University in South Korea earlier this year. He attained his Master's degree from the same University in 2014.

His field of specialization is fluid machinery (pumps and turbines) and renewable energy in the areas of energy storage (pump-turbine), wind, wave, tidal energy and hydro turbines (Francis, cross flow bulb/propeller)

Growing up Dr Singh says he was torn between pursuing a career in medicine and engineering. According to the Assistant Professor his family and mentors encouraged him to join the medical field while he had a passion for planning, designing and construction of buildings and other

structures.

"Architectural works, in the material form of buildings, are often perceived as cultural symbols and as works of art – this was my interest. The sad thing was that it was not offered at undergraduate level which made me take up Bachelor of Engineering Technology (Mechanical/Manufacturing)," the young academic said.

Dr Singh was fortunate to have secured a scholarship from the Korean Government Scholarship Program to pursue his Master's studies. "My scholarship came with a condition that I must learn Korean language. I studied the language for 2 years."

He describes himself as in between an intermediate and fluent speaker of Korean language. He is able to understand it really well and communicate within reasonable limits.

"Now, I want to focus on the renewable energy sector and through FNU educate the upcoming generation on the importance and usage of renewable energies that we have readily available in our beautiful country."

"During the first year in Korea, I felt like quitting and returning to Fiji. Adapting to the food, language, weather and staying away from home was just too much to cope with. Fortunately, there were other foreign students in my group and we just encouraged and assisted each other in this journey."

Upon completion of his Master's degree and with the support from his Professors, Dr Singh continued with his studies and pursed a PhD in Korea under Woojung Education and Culture Foundation scholarship.

"My family encouraged me to go ahead and complete my doctorate degree. I acknowledge the Fijian Embassy for pointing me towards the Woojung Education and Culture Foundation that is founded by Lee Joong Keun, who offered me a scholarship to further my studies. This Scholarship Foundation offers scholarships to more than 100 students per semester from developing countries to study in Korea."

"I also acknowledge my church pastors in Korea who treated me as their own son and during this time, I also met my better half who was my pillar of strength in difficult times."

Dr Singh commended the relationship between the universities and industries in Korea.

"While we were full time students, we were also involved in several research and development projects with industries which was funded by the government – we were exposed to a lot of engineering work."

One of his most notable achievements is the design of a hydrofoil for tidal current turbines for which he was awarded by the Korean Society of Mechanical Engineers.

He also designed an experimental test rig on a pump-turbine system for energy storage systems for his laboratory work.

"Now, I want to focus on the renewable energy sector and through FNU educate the upcoming generation on the importance and usage of renewable energies that we have readily available in our beautiful country."

"All we have to do is to tap into it in an environmental friendly way where we do not end up exploiting these resources. All the research work that I did in Korea can be applied in Fiji."

It has been almost a year now since his to Fiji after being away for a little over seven and half years.

"I am still trying to adjust to life here but overall my learning journey has been an interesting one and I hope the same continues for the academic career."

In addition to writing scholarly publications and lecturing, Dr Singh enjoys playing soccer and hiking.

wenty-three year old Joana Didrua has big shoes to fill but she's up to the challenge.

Graduating with a Trade Diploma in Electrical Engineering (Electrical) from the College of Engineering, Science and Technology, Didrua was inspired by her late father Penijamini Ralogaivalu to take up the blue collar trade.

"Being an electrical engineer won't be an easy task. I will have to be on-call during emergencies and natural disasters and sometimes I might have to work beyond the normal 8-5 hour shift, but I am ready for it," said Didrua holding her graduation certificate proudly.

"When I was growing up, I would watch my father taking pride in his job, my siblings and I used to see that satisfaction in his eyes, whenever he was able to help anyone with the skills he had. So that encouraged me to enrol at FNU."

"I am over-whelmed, all my struggles are paying off and my dreams are now becoming a reality," said Didrua.

Originally from Savusavu, Didrua said her success is the result of her mother's hard work and sacrifices.

Her mother Siteri Nakubu said fulfilling her

daughter's dream as a single-parent was not easy.

"There have been various times when my children and I missed their late father. He would have been really proud unfortunately he is not around to see this day," said an emotional Nakubu.

Didrua who was one of the two females who graduated in this programme, said she intends to learn as much as she can in this field once she enters the workforce.

"I want to serve my country and my people to access clean and an affordable electricity," she said.

Fellow graduate Sulueti Tamanalevu said there were times when Joana and her found Electrical Engineering challenging, however they remained determined towards their goal.

"There were some tasks where it required more manpower, we felt we won't be able to do it. We even had to compete with the male students but we did not look back," said Tamanalevu.

The Tailevu native said joining the electrical field was her childhood dream.

"I have always wanted to know how we get electricity plus I have an uncle who is my mentor, he took electrical too and I got inspired by him," she added.

Tamanalevu hopes to encourage more female students in joining the electrical field.

"It's surprising to see that very few women choose Electrical Engineering as their career. I have never seen anything that makes it less suitable for women. We need to break this norm," she said.

"Through this programme, we have learnt Electrical safety and other occupational health and safety fundamentals along with project management of electrical installations and basic engineering calculations."

"Overall, the programme was challenging but if you put your focus on your studies, you can overcome those hurdles and will be able to finish all your units with flying colors," said Tamanalevu.

# Raman wins Special Award in Eye Care

rowing along the sugarcane belt in Vunivau on the outskirts of Labasa town, Jaishree Raman had a dream of pursuing a career where she could help people and make a difference in their lives.

Raman, who attended All Saints Secondary School, decided on a career in the medical field. After attaining a Diploma in Nursing in 2010, she worked as a Nurse at the Lautoka Hospital until 2013. She then moved to Suva to join the Pacific Eye Institute as a Theatre Nurse.

She found her true calling there and decided to study Postgraduate Diploma in Eye Care offered by the Fiji National University (FNU).

And after undergoing successful which restored their vision, the smile on their face is indescribable," Raman said.

The Vunivau native aims to continue to help people in the community by pursuing Masters studies in the area of Public Health.

"In Fiji, there has been very little research done for eye care and with the high rate of diabetes, which affects the eyes, I hope to create more awareness," she said.

Raman is also aware that achieving this ambitions goal will be no easy feat.

"Challenges were many because I was working student so I had to balance by studies and work. Sometimes I had to come early to the clinic to make up the number of patients I had to see," she said.

Raman, also acknowledged the support of her family and God's guidance in her life.

"When I joined nursing school, I wanted to make a difference in community by broadening my horizon. I think, the eye care programme at FNU is really good and if more people do this, it will be a big help to the community," she commented.

Raman also shared a timely message for aspiring students.

"Working hard is the key to success and you have to tell yourself that you can do better than what you did before. Being in competition with your own self will take you long way," she said.



# Breaking barriersCakauniqoliqoli graduates as QS

eing the youngest and only female Estimator at her workplace is a great honour for new graduate Elenoa Cakauniqoliqoli.

Cakauniqoliqoli, with origins from the chiefly island of Serua, graduated with a Trade Diploma in Quantity Surveying from Fiji National University's (FNU) College of Engineering, Science and Technology (CEST). The 21-year-old is employed at Rawlinson Jenkins Limited based in Suva.

"Being the youngest and only female in my team at work means I get to learn a lot from my senior colleagues. They have been helpful in sharing new knowledge and skills with me. It's a good working environment and I love my job," Cakauniqoliqoli said.

"Despite being the only female in my team, I am treated with the same level of respect as everyone else because everyone is committed to excelling as a team. This also helps me build my confidence in my field of work.

Cakauniqoliqoli, after completing high school at Ratu Latianara College in Serua, began to explore tertiary education programmes best suited for her liking.

Whilst discussing options with her family, Cakauniqoliqoli's mother suggested that she enrol in the Quantity Surveying (QS) course that was offered at FNU's Derrick Campus in Samabula

"I was looking at FNU courses at the College of Engineering, Science and Technology when my mother suggested I look at QS. It was new to me so I did my own research and found out that it was a field with high job prospects in Fiji," Cakauniqoliqoli said.

"I also realised that my mum had suggested the course to me because it complemented the subjects I excelled at in high school, such as Math.

"Deciding to challenge myself in this field that caught my interest after I had researched about it, in 2016 I enrolled in the Trade Diploma

The role of a quantity surveyor (QS) is to conduct and manage all costs relating to

building and civil engineering projects, from the initial calculations to the final figures. This means measuring and calculating how much material is needed and how much it will cost.

A QS also ensures that building projects is constructed within budgets that have been set out, prepares pricing documents and conducts value determination and risk management. A QS graduate enters the workforce as an Estimator.

Cakauniqoliqoli said it was a new experience for her to undergo the one-year eight months trade diploma programme when she began her university studies.

"I just finished high school and from doing five subjects the whole year I had to transition into the trimester mode doing different unit topics so this was new to me but something I was equally excited about because every day I knew I was learning something new.'

"Even though at times I felt disheartened trying to juggle school, studies and my social life I was always motivated by the thought 'struggle now, enjoy later'," she shared with a laugh.

"I am happy I enrolled in this programme because calculating and doing the costing for building projects like a two-bedroom house from foundation to the roofs and all the structures in between made me understand the complexity and the hard work that it done behind the scenes of these projects.

Cakauniqoliqoli added that being taught at FNU by lecturers who were experienced and well-versed in the industry made learning easier and the assistance they provided helped her complete important tasks such as her final vear project.

She said lecturers would sometimes conduct extra classes in the evening for the benefit of the students so that they were able to understand and complete their projects.

"Despite being a traditionally male-dominated field, females are now taking up this course and I would encourage everyone to consider this programme as there's not a lot of Quantity Surveyors here in Fiji."

"On our way to graduation, my parents told me they were really proud of me and I was truly humbled to hear this as I plan to support them and the rest of my family in any way I can.'


"During my graduation, I realised that the saying 'follow your dreams' is not just a cliché but something everyone should do for themselves."
