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When I was an undergraduate student over 30 years ago, personal computers, smart phones and the internet had yet to be invented. The university library was the place you went to access books and journals. You had to find the location of the book you wanted from a card indexing system, then go hunting for it hoping that no-one else had taken it (or hidden it somewhere else).

Most books, and all journals, were reference only because they were in such short supply, so you had to sit in the library to read the material. To help readers concentrate and avoid damaging the books and journals, university libraries had strict policies which prohibited talking, eating or drinking.

In today's digitally-connected world, university libraries have been radically impacted by two major developments. The first is that books and journals are now available online. Searching for a particular item takes a couple of clicks, then another click to download it onto your computer. Because materials are available *(Continued on Page 3...)*

# **EBSCO Information Session**



EBSCO Information Services, the leading provider of research databases, e-journals, magazine subscriptions, e-books and discovery service was at Fiji National University on the 8th of April and again on the 12th of April. On the 8th of April, **Ms. Nadia Davis** (left) and **Ms. Tracie Dawson** (right) visited the Natabua Campus Library and held an information session with the students and facutly members. A number of faculty members attended the session and received a detailed training session on EBSCO services.

In the central division at the Nasinu Campus on the 12th of April , 2019 in the Main Boardroom, the session was also positively received as a number of staff were present during the session. Both sessions focused on the various services provided by EBSCO to which FNU subcribes to, however, more additional services were discussed that could further enhance the quality of resources and services FNU provides to its patrons. The session gave the university an opportunity to discuss a new platform that could revolutionize the procurement process of reference material.

To further discuss this, the team will be conversing with FNU Library personnel and also with ICT to determine the feasibility of such projects and the real time application of it on the 11th of June 2019. Along with this, there will be discussions on **Stacks** - a web based content mangement systems (CMS) that could be the future of Libraries.

#### **SciFinder Demonstration**



Mr. Andrew McKay was in Fiji National University 21st on the of March 2019 for the Scifinder Information and Training session. The university library team held the session in Samabula Campus Library. The SciFinder is the world's largest scientific database with more chemical,

biological and related science information than any other resource. This includes extensive medical science information with our inclusion. Whilst SciFinder is the world's largest chemistry database, it is also one of the world's largest related sciences database as well with world-leading medical, biological, physical, environmental and marine science content that is used extensively by almost all Universities in Australia and New Zealand. you can search and download them from anywhere – in the library in your hostel room, or in the coffee shop. The second development is pedagogical. 30 years ago, students were expected to memorise theories and regurgitate them in examinations. Today, the onus is on critical thinking and problem solving. Rather than swotting for examinations, students are increasingly required to work together in groups to analyse problems and come up with solutions.

The implications of these two developments for university libraries are profound. There is no reason for any student to sit in a library reading books and journals, when they can access them online from anywhere. However, what today's students need is social spaces where they can work together in groups, accessing online library materials as and when they need them.

This is the vision behind the drive to transform our own university libraries in **'Open Learning Commons'**, which provide welcoming and flexible social spaces for students to engage with the library's resources – with support from our professional librarians as needed – and work on group projects together. The new Open Learning Commons at the Koronivia Library sets the new benchmark, as we convert all our other libraries into vibrant social learning hubs.
