s the Fiji National University (FNU) heads toward the second half of the academic year, it does so with a great sense of accomplishment, excitement and anticipation for the term ahead.

In the first half of the year, the University welcomed our students back on campus for face-to-face learning; provided students with the necessary support services needed to enhance their academic studies; opened new facilities such as the state-of-the-art FNU Sports and Wellness Centre for our students, staff and the FNU community; renewed and formalised partnerships with various stakeholders such as the Pacific Disability Forum, Sugar Research Institute of Fiji, Australian Centre for International Agricultural Research (ACIAR) Pacific Agriculture Scholarships and Support Programme (PASS), Telecom Fiji Ltd, University of Wollongong, Oklahoma State University and the University of Auckland; and set the wheels in motion for the establishment of the Monash University-FNU Pacific Island Countries (PICs) Climate Change Research Centre (CCRC).

The University continuously evolves and enhances its delivery of learning, teaching and research to ensure all our students receive an accessible, inclusive and affordable education. Students and those interested in pursuing tertiary education have the opportunity to Apply for Semester 2 studies at FNU.

Study programmes

Our mission is to support the economic and social development of Fiji through relevant and highquality education and training. The University offers a wide range of programmes through our College of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry (CAFF), College of Business, Hospitality and Tourism Studies (CBHTS), College of Engineering, Science and Technology (CEST), College of Humanities and Education (CHE) and College of Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences (CMNHS), National Training and Productivity Centre (NTPC) and the Fiji Maritime Academy (FMA). FNU has multiple entry pathways, which provide students with the option of studying at the technical and vocational education and training (TVET) level (Certificate or Diploma) or in Higher Education which consists of Degree, Postgraduate, Masters and Doctorate (PhD) studies. This ensures that every local, regional and international student has a chance to achieve their academic ambitions right here at Fiji's national university.

qualifications, with flexible class times and online sessions enabling students to balance work and studies.

Our facilities

FNU has upgraded its campus facilities over the years, with modern Learning Commons available for student discussions and study sessions. With a seating capacity of 680, FNU has the largest lecture theatre in Fiji which is located at our Natabua campus in Lautoka. Each of our campuses has facilities such as libraries, computer labs, discussion rooms and practical labs and workshops to complement students' classroom-based learning.

As the national institution, FNU has a special interest role in one of the Pacific's historical professions and this is evident in the construction of a three-storey teaching and research building at our Fiji Maritime Academy (FMA). I'm pleased to also mention that our four-storey CBHTS building at the Nasinu campus is progressing well and both are expected to be completed before August.

FNU has also expanded its tertiary training and education services in the North through the new Naduna campus in Labasa. The Campus opened for Semester 1 operations in March this year and provides students in the North with a conducive and consolidated campus learning environment.

TVET courses that were introduced this year at the campus include courses in Cookery, Baking and Patisserie, Housekeeping & Accommodation Operations, Office Assistance and Restaurant Services, plus the Diploma in Hotel Management, Trade Diploma in Front Office Operations and the Trade Diploma and Bachelor in Hospitality and Hotel Management programmes.

Our Naduna campus comprises a Carpentry Workshop, Plumbing Workshop, Mechanical Workshop, Electrical Workshop and a Training Kitchen, alongside a Modern Library with seafarers, entrepreneurs, quantity surveyors and architects, land surveyors, tourism, culinary and hospitality specialists, computer scientists, mechanics, carpenters and electricians and agriculture, fisheries and forestry experts.

Our TVET courses offered in Certificate III, Certificate IV and Diploma levels are also supported through the Tertiary Scholarships and Loans Service (TSLS). The Fijian Government has provided 5,000 placements for Fijians to undertake the opportunity to gain skills and qualification in a TVET field of their choice and contribute to the economy upon completion as trade workers and/or entrepreneurs.

Students and those eligible for TSLS-funded studies must have successfully completed Year 12 with a minimum mark of 200/400 or completed Level I and II studies from the Technical College of Fiji or equivalent institutions.

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PURSUE TVET STUDIES AT FNU

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he Fiji National University (FNU) is a dual-sector university offering a growing range of qualifications in both technical and vocational education and training (TVET) and higher education stream of learning. The

University offers programmes to our local, regional and international students that range from certificate to doctorate levels. Since its establishment in 2010, and through the legacies of some of FNU's founding institutions, providing technical training has been a core and historical function of the University. In addition, FNU is also focused on developing both the technical skills and competencies as well as 'soft skills' like critical thinking and teamwork, to enable our graduates to succeed in a fast-changing labour market.

At FNU, we are focused on ensuring that our students are not just highly employable the day after

graduation, but who can continue learning during their working lives.

TVET aids economic recovery

Fiji is an upper middle-income country that is on the path to recovery, with the economy slowly steadying itself. We are seeing the agriculture, construction and service sectors leading the charge in rebuilding and there is also a demand for skilled carpenters, plumbers, electricians, chefs, cooks and front office hotel staff – all of whom would be TVET graduates. As economies develop, there will be a growing need for both TVET and higher education graduates.

Our Goal

At FNU, we understand the need for young people to be empowered with opportunities of acquiring quality education, skills training and a curriculum that encourages innovation and sustainable learning. This aligns with our strategic vision of providing a positive and enriching student experience and education for employability. The University works closely with our industry and education partners to formulate and offer relevant programmes, address industry needs and standards and ensure our graduates are highly skilled and employable. We also work closely with educational agencies to conduct regular programme reviews and accreditation. This further strengthens our learning and teaching delivery.

Fijian Government's focus and support

Fiji is making technical and vocational training as attractive as any other academic field of study so there is an increase in suitably qualified graduates in the future. This is both a pragmatic and practical approach that will assist in meeting the labour demands a little quicker than the conventional academic pursuits. Fiji, like other countries, relies on TVET to enable and empower people to cope with pressures such as poverty, climate change adaptation and skilled migration.

TVET placements at FNU

TVET studies are deeply ingrained in the foundations of the Fijian Government's education plan and this has been clearly demonstrated with the allocation of 5000 places for TVET studies at FNU through TSLS (Tertiary Scholarships and Loans Service) support. The Government's vision of investing significant resources to attract brilliant young minds to the TVET cadre of learning is commendable.

Those who wish to pursue a TVET programme at FNU and study through a placement from TSLS can choose from a range of Certificate III, Certificate IV and Diploma level qualifications.

Students eligible for TSLS-funded studies must have successfully completed Year 12 with a minimum mark of 200/400 or completed Level I and II studies from the Technical College of Fiji or equivalent institutions.

Students are encouraged to register their applications with TSLS whilst applying for their TVET studies at FNU.

MAILE JOINS SWIRE SHIPPING

L

uisa Maile never imagined that she would one day work on board an international shipping vessel.

The 23-year-old was one of 11 students from the Fiji National University's (FNU), Fiji Maritime Academy (FMA) who was

recently recruited by Swire Shipping. The second-year Diploma in Nautical Science student was overwhelmed with her selection and was grateful to all those involved in her journey.

"For us cadets, this is such a big opportunity. If we join a local vessel, our COC (Certificate of Competency) will be limited locally, but if we join a foreign vessel, it's an unlimited COC. This would enable us to sail onboard any ship plying worldwide. Needless to say, this makes it such a great opportunity," she said.

After being notified of her selection, Maile (*pictured right*) had delayed informing her parents, having remembered their disapproval when she first decided to join the Academy.

"Initially, my family were a bit hesitant as the maritime industry is male-dominated, however, they became



supportive after learning that an increasing number of women are now entering this industry globally."

"I think they will be happy about my selection, but I know my father will be a little upset that I will be gone for a long time."

Fueled by her dreams to travel to her home island in

Ogea, Lau, Maile opted for a non-conventional route.

"I have never been to my home island. I took Nautical Science because I wanted to do something for a change. Instead of being a passenger going back to the islands, I wanted to be one of the masters to bring back a vessel."

She added that her experience at FNU provided her with the necessary skills to excel in her endeavours.

"This opportunity means so much to me. I can finally obtain that COC that I have been trying to get for a long time and it makes me so happy to know that my dreams will be realised soon."

Prior to her selection, Maile was serving her sea time requirement with the Interlink vessel, Westerland.

Having spent 11 months with the shipping company, Maile has relished the work experience and now calls the sea her home.

"I adapted because I spent most of my time on board, so now when I am ashore, I miss life at sea and prefer life out there than on land."

Maile encourages more females to enrol at the Fiji National University and pursue a career in the maritime industry.

LEARNING NEVER STOPS FOR SHARMA



meet Kumar Sharma always had a desire to secure a stable career in the trade field and this motivated him to study Certificate his mother's blessing.

"She is the sweetest person and the most kindhearted woman I have had in my life. She is creative,

"By joining the trade field, you will learn the skills for life. Once you master one trade, you can learn other trades and become multi-skilled and you will be in high demand. If you acquire trade skills, then you can also be your own boss, and your tools are your assets to earn money. You can continue working after retiring or when you lose a job, and construction work will never end."

Sharma (*pictured right*) said life had taught him many lessons, and he is proud of where he is today with

helpful, and loving in nature. She is a market vendor and has worked hard to win many battles for herself and I," he said.

"I chose to study cabinet making and joinery because I love to work with timbers and board, which I used to design in my young days. Every day, there are new things to learn in this field," he said.

"After completing my studies, I joined WoodQuest joinery as a Project manager. Some major projects completed under my supervision were HFC Bank, Bred Bank, and the Valelevu courthouse," Sharma said.

Sharma is currently employed at the Bank Of Baroda as a service staff, where he undertakes various jobs using skill and knowledge.

He is also pursuing a Certificate in Banking from FNU.

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yvia Swamy needed close attention and assistance to go about her daily routine early in her life. Fortunately, this changed after she underwent a successful life-changing surgery when she was 11 years old.

Prior to this, she could not walk, as she was born physically disabled. The little sense of independence gained from having the ability to walk, although supported by a walker, changed her life forever.

Now at 23 years old, Swamy (pictured right) is close to completing her Certificate III in Office Assistant at the Fiji National University (FNU), something she had difficulty fathoming while growing up but was always determined to achieve.

With a good support system, Swamy has broken stereotypical perceptions of persons with disabilities and has already landed interviews for employment positions.

Relentless in her pursuit of a better life, Swamy has never let her disability dissuade her from completing her goals. "When I started walking, it was a very big thing," she said.

"Even though I can't walk normally, at least I can still walk. I can do things by myself. I can even help with the housework. It gives me a degree of independence."

"For someone who only reached class four, coming to university was a great achievement for me.'

Swamy had taken vocational classes at the National Council for Persons with Disabilities complex prior to joining FNU.

"My mother pushed me to go to University. She was the one that said I could do it. I was taking computing at the vocational centre and they saw that I was good and sent me here."

With four more units to complete her programme, Swamy attests it has not been a smooth sailing journey, especially living away from her family who are in Labasa.

"The transition to University from the Vocational Centre was challenging because I was coming into a whole new environment. The Centre was familiar to me because we were all the same, in a sense. I had never done units like accounting, so it was different."

"I am grateful however that the lecturers here are helpful and that my friends have been supportive. If I am not able to go to classes, the lecturers come to me and so while it has not been easy, it has been a great learning experience so far."

She added that although there has been progress in realising the rights of persons with disabilities, greater awareness is still needed to change the mindsets of individuals.

"When I was on my way to a job interview, I was stopped by a man who asked me why I walked like this and if I was asking for money. I was surprised at the mentality that some people still had. So we must change people's mindsets. We are not always asking for money. Some of us are trying to live independently," she said.

Swamy added she was grateful for the University's efforts in ensuring accessibility and an encouraging and empowering environment for persons with disabilities.

CMNHS COMMENCES INDUSTRY OUTREACH



ollaborating closely with industry partners and stakeholders allows universities to formulate and offer relevant programmes, skills and qualifications and ensures that students are competent and workforce-ready upon graduation. At the Fiji National University (FNU), this is standard practice as its Colleges and Centres work closely with relevant organisations in the design and implementation of our courses.

Maintaining these working relationships are important to ensure the University receives constructive feedback on its services and graduates, as well as keep abreast with industry needs and standards. To this end, FNU's College of Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences' (CMNHS) conducted the University's first Industry Outreach Activity (IOA) this year with a discussion session by the School of Nursing and representatives from the Ministry of Health and Medical Services.

CMNHS Acting Dean, Dr Donald Wilson said the dialogue centred around the College's Certificate in Enrolled Nursing (Level 4) programme.

"The discussions were timely given the current situation faced in the nursing sector," Dr Wilson said.

"We were able to highlight issues from both the College and the ministry that needs to be addressed regarding the course."

"It is important that we continuously have these interactive discussions with stakeholders regarding all our technical and vocational education and training (TVET) and higher education programmes to ensure we are meeting the industry needs with highly-skilled graduates."

Ministry representatives included Chief Nursing and Midwife Officer (CNMO) and Registrar to the Fiji Nursing Council, Colleen Wilson, Director of Nursing St Giles Hospital, Miliakere Nasorovakawalu, Acting Director of Nursing Central Division, Keleti Wainiqolo and Acting Director of Nursing CWM Hospital, Luisa Wauca.

Acting Head of School Nursing, Talica Lewanavanua said the nursing faculty valued the insights and unique contributions made by stakeholders for the benefit and enhanced education of future nurses.

FNU's remaining Colleges will also undertake IOAs



with their respective stakeholders over the coming weeks, with a particular focus on the TVET courses offered at FNU.

in a series of virtual information sessions with career teachers from around the country. 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MOCELOLOKULA PERSEVERES IN LAW STUDIES



our years after switching her tertiary institution and study programme, Talatoka Vusoniua Mocelolokula has no regrets and looks forward to graduating from the Fiji National University (FNU) in the coming months.

Mocelolokula (*pictured above*), is from Cawaro village, Udu Point in Vanua Levu. She is a final-year Bachelor of Laws (LLB) student completing her last unit at FNU's Nasinu Campus.

She had earlier completed her primary and secondary education at Tacirua Primary School, Suva Grammar School and Laucala Bay Secondary School. After a break from studies, she pursued Year 13 again through the Nabua Matua programme before undertaking her tertiary learning at FNU.

Offered by the College of Business, Hospitality and Tourism Studies (CBHTS), the four-year LLB programme is designed to equip successful graduates with the skills and competency to enter into private practice as a barrister or solicitor. Graduates may also work as corporate lawyers for large firms, legal officers in the public service, community lawyers or in various positions outside the legal profession.

For Mocelolokula, taking a chance and listening to her older brother's encouragement was a decision she has benefitted from.

"In 2018, I had already enrolled at another tertiary institution in Geography studies when my older brother Ropate Robi suggested that I also enrol and study Law with him at FNU," she shared.

"I always had an interest in this field of study so without a second thought, I joined my brother at FNU and we have motivated and assisted each other throughout our studies."

"This has been an enriching student journey and despite the obstacles, I am proud to be nearing my academic goal with the help of my brother, family and loved ones."

As a full-time working student, her primary role is being a mother to her two young children.

"It was never easy and smooth sailing for me," she said. "However, over the years I have learnt the importance of time management and balancing my academic, work and family life."

"I've made sacrifices over time to ensure I could complete what was required of me academically and for this, I am grateful to my parents and siblings for helping care for my children while I was completing assignments or studying for an exam. Sometimes, they also accompany me to lectures on campus."

FNU STAFF MEMBERS PITCH TOP BUSINESS IDEAS



iji National University (FNU) staff members Ram Singh and Vijayta Sharma pitched outstanding business ideas at the inaugural 2022 Ubercamp and were awarded first and second prize respectively.

Singh won the top prize of \$1500 while Sharma the runner-up won \$1000.

The Ubercamp workshop was conducted through a formal application process where successful applicants were selected from undergraduate and graduate students and early-career researchers to pitch their entrepreneurial ideas after successful coaching sessions by experts.

The three-day Ubercamp aimed to prepare people for a business pitch, capture the entrepreneurial mindset, and explore young people's prioritisation of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). It encourages individuals to use technology and other modern methods and learn new ways to become successful entrepreneurs.

Singh's pitch was on sustainable agriculture and renewable energy. He presented the idea of using agriphotovoltaics in a distributed fashion to reduce the dependence on food imports and make farmers energy independent.

"I developed the pitch after getting the invitation to be part of Ubercamp, and since the topics were linked to the SDGs, I realised that our country, even though we are known for agriculture, 70 per cent of the economy is service-based, and when a pandemic strikes, we struggle. I was thinking about how we can support our agriculture industry to stand on its own and reduce food imports," he said.

Singh, 27, is an assistant instructor at FNU's College of Electronic and Science Technology (CEST).

He is currently enrolled in a Higher Degree by Research programme at FNU.

"I have learnt a lot about how to conduct pitches, and it is quite an eye-opener because you think investors are interested in the finances and how it works. But what it comes down to is the people and their emotions. We should know what they care about and what we care about for the people," Singh (*pictured far right*) said.

"The idea was to present a viable solution that tackles problems of survival with the worsening climate crisis and the increasing risks of global pandemics. The proposition marries solar energy and controlled agriculture. The main issue with traditional solar energy farms is that they hog up a lot of land that would generally be used for farming or housing. The pitch suggests that we can use the same piece of land to plant crops and harvest solar energy. This type of implementation has several benefits, such as increased yields, more efficient solar panels, and a reduction in our food imports as we can now produce a wider range of produce."

Sharma (*pictured below left*) is a Student Service Coordinator at FNU and said the Ubercamp workshop was beneficial to all participants as it encouraged creativity in terms of generating innovative entrepreneurial ideas.

"I think the camp was an eye-opener for us as we expected something else, but when we attended the workshop, it encouraged our entrepreneurial skills to come out. It has been a good learning experience for all," she said.

"The 90 seconds pitch competition is where we presented the entrepreneurial plan, and in this, we had to focus on why we wanted that idea to happen and the benefits. It was a challenge to deliver the whole business plan in 90 seconds."



"My pitch was on employer-supported childcare facility, as we see that most working parents are struggling to find an affordable, safe, reliable childcare service centre within their vicinity. This is one of the biggest barriers for women in the workforce, as our young mothers struggle to choose kids over work. Thus, it is high time for organisations to realise their corporate social responsibilities and support their human capital by providing in-house childcare facilities."

The FNU 2022 workshop was funded by the Association of Commonwealth Universities, the FNU Students Association and FNU's Research Office.

Those who wish to pursue a technical and vocational education and training (TVET) programme at FNU can also study through placements provided by the Tertiary Scholarships and Loans Service (TSLS).

Offered through the University's TVET Pasifika, these courses are Certificate III, Certificate IV and Diploma level qualifications.

Students eligible for TSLS-funded studies must have successfully completed Year 12 with a minimum mark of 200/400 or completed Level I and II studies from the Technical College of Fiji or equivalent institutions. Applications for Semester 2 studies are now open.

Reddy completed primary school at Naleba Bhartiya School and high school at Naleba College and Labasa College. She then studied
