Prof Karstadt also mentioned the key University highlights below;

- The University has introduced Basic Operations in a Call-Centre course this year through the Fijian Government's Reskilling and Upskilling initiative. The Level 3 programme was designed by FNU in collaboration with the Business Process Outsourcing (BPO) Council.
- FNU is also actively involved in climate change work through the Climate-U Project in Tailevu, where university staff have been engaged in community projects that includes tree planting, water source enhancement via borehole and piping, alternative water sourcing and improvement work,



drainage improvement, solar light installations, and water tank installation.

- FNU has introduced a new Bachelor of Sports Science programme this year for students interested in a career in sports science.
- FNU's College of Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences is offering new short courses and programmes which includes; Managing Oral Medicine and Oral Pathology cases in Dental Practice, Postgraduate Diploma in Dental Public Health, a Level 4 Certificate in Health Professions Foundation Studies and Responding to Gender – Based Violence (GBV) in the Pacific: Foundation of Health Care Practice.
- The University has also signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with iMGINE Engineering & Technologies PTE Limited and RC Manubhai & Co. PTE Limited, and Fiji Airways. This would allow our students to get their experience in their field of study and give back to the nation.



"When my name was announced as the Overall Best Apprenticeship Award recipient, I was utterly taken aback. It caught me by surprise," he revealed.


"I thank the Almighty for the reward. I am also grateful to have been picked for the award."

pending close to eight hours on campus for the last four years made the Fiji National University (FNU) home away from home for top Engineering student Shavneil Chand.

The 24-year-old graduated with a Bachelor of Engineering (Honours) Electrical (First Class) alongside his twin brother, Shavin Chand from the College of Engineering, Science and Technology (CEST).

Fascinated from a young age about how electricity is generated, Chand enrolled into this programme to understand and become qualified in the field of electrical

Upon completing our secondary education, my twin brother and I were both awarded the National Toppers Scheme (NTS) and both enrolled at FNU to study electrical engineering," he said. The former Vashist Muni High School student says the

'Students were able to identify specific programmes that they could apply for based on their subject combination and career aspirations," Lal said.

"The main presentations were on TVET Pasifika and how students can take advantage of the support that the Tertiary Scholarships and Loans Service (TSLS) is providing to students who study at FNU."

"There are a total of 4,600 places available for students to study TVET at FNU that is supported by TSLS."

200 students can also take advantage of the grant available for students who wish to take up TVET at FNU and score at least 250 in Year 13 and 270 in Year 12 in the 2022 External Exams.

The FNU Outreach Team intends to reach out to students, schools, communities, and industries to provide information on study opportunities at FNU.

## GAIN LIFELONG SKILLS THROUGH TVET STUDIES AT FNU



s a dual-sector tertiary education provider, the Fiji National University (FNU) offering a growing range of qualifications from certificate to doctorate levels.

This allows graduates from one discipline to develop new expertise

and competencies in another. The University is also focused on developing both the technical skills and competencies as well as 'soft skills' like critical thinking and teamwork to enable our graduates to succeed in a fast-changing labour market.

At FNU, we understand the need for young people to be empowered with opportunities of acquiring quality educa-tion, skills training and a curriculum that encourages innova-tion and sustainable learning.

Our TVET programmes are designed to assist a wide range of economic sectors pertinent to our region,

including agriculture and the marine sector, hospitality and tourism, business and commerce, engineering and technology, education, and community care.

Our diverse TVET course offerings provide individuals and organisations with opportunities to learn and upskill and reskill to meet the changing demands of national and regional labour markets now and in the future.

#### TSLS support

The Tertiary Scholarships and Loans Service (TSLS) is providing 4,600 study placements for students who wish to undertake a TVET course at FNU.

Students eligible for TSLS-funded studies must have successfully completed Year 12, Certificate I, Certificate II or secured a final offer letter for any Certificate Level III, IV or Diploma level 5 programmes offered at FNU.

Although she had initially dreamt of being an aviation engineer, Sikoa decided to pursue studies in an alternative TVET programme after undergoing academic counselling at FNU.

She then enrolled in the Certificate IV in Plant Maintenance (Certificate in Plant Maintenance Engineering (Level 4)) programme at the College of Engineering, Science and Technology (CEST).

"I was very excited as I had looked forward to studying at Fiji National University as it dawned on me that it was an institution that provided industrial attachments and since I was a hands-on person, FNU was an easy choice," she said.

"I am glad that doing the attachment was a requirement for graduation. This allowed me to apply what I learnt in the classroom in the workplace. It also gave me enough experience to be able to secure a job upon graduation."

Sikoa added that her peers, who were mostly men as she studied in a traditionally male-dominated field, also added to her student experience.

"We were always discussing things, coming up with ideas, and trying to push each other to do well and graduate. Practical classes were my favourite as I was able to test my theoretical knowledge and learn as much as I could from the lecturers, who were patient when it came to teaching students," she said.

"I also enjoyed the educational field trips that were coordinated by the University. Being exposed to the potential companies and their expectations broadened my knowledge of the companies and instilled in me the skills that I needed to work on to successfully graduate."

"I vividly remember visiting Fiji Sugar Cooperation, Dominion Cables, Fiji Water and Douglas Pharmaceuticals, which motivated me to excel in my studies as I dreamt of being employed by one of these reputable organisations one day."

#### **Family support**

Having strong family support and perseverance was the beacon of hope that Sikoa relied on during her studies.

"My family has been a major source of support throughout my life and I am forever grateful for that. I acknowledge the lecturers we had as they always motivated and guided us every step of the way" she shared

Sikoa dedicated her graduation and achievement to her parents and her sister, who is also a third-year nursing student at FNU.

#### Career

Sikoa is currently employed at the feed mill by Goodman Fielder International.

Interacting with people and being open to learning new things has allowed Sikoa to progress from being an engineering apprentice in 2017.

"I got promoted to join the projects team as a project engineer and, after the completion of the project, I joined the engineering team as a permanent fitter," she said.

"She is currently the Health Safety and Environment Cadet."

Her role involves briefing managers on compliance-workplace issues and compiling and collating reports.

#### Volunteer work

Giving back to the community through volunteer work is also a passion for Sikoa.

She volunteered in 2021 with Ronald Macdonald's House of Charities at the Colonial War Memorial (CWM) Hospital and spent time in the children's unit.

In addition to this, she is also engaged in the Vunilagi Book Club, where she reads to children.

Sikoa's advice to students is to work hard and never give up.

"Be patient. Not all successful people start from the top of the hierarchy. They had to get their hands dirty, serve others or work long hours," she said.
