Beacon of Hope in the Shadows

In a world where access to technology and electricity is often taken for granted, Reavi Moilase's journey is a testament to the indomitable human spirit and the power of education.

Hailing from humble beginnings, the Kadavu native's family has struggled with having no access to electricity or internet connectivity.

Born to parents whose daily grind revolved around manual labour and domestic duties, the Moilase family has faced challenges that Reavi is not ashamed to hide. Her father, a grass cutter, toils under the scorching sun to provide for his family, while her mother diligently tended to domestic duties and her younger sister, who is a Year 1 student.

"I am not ashamed of where I come from and the struggles I had to go through to get here, they have given me the determination to change the future not only for myself but for my younger sister," she shared.

"I did not finish high school because my mother had found out about the programmes offered at FNU that were available to students as young as 16."

"Seeing the struggles of my family and the urgency to be able to provide for them as soon as possible, I took the opportunity to pursue a Trade Diploma in Information Technology (Level 5) at the Fiji National University's (FNU), College of Engineering, Science and Technology (CEST) despite my young age."

Moilase said that her mother had seen her passion for technology and often did odd jobs around the community to allow her funds to purchase her gadgets and resources to develop her passion.

"My mother believes in me a lot and I do not want to let her down. I will be forever grateful to FNU for providing free Wi-Fi and access to the campus facilities like the library after hours so that students who come from low-income earning families like me can turn our dreams into reality," said the finalyear student.

"I joined university when I was 16, I was terrified, but I remembered my parent's sacrifices. These sacrifices only fuelled my determination to

She said she was grateful for the friendly staff and learning environment at FNU which made her feel welcome and at home.

The former Suva Grammar School student hopes to inspire other young people who are struggling economically to press on and take up the various opportunities that are available at FNU.

"My story isn't about my struggles, it is about how I overcame those struggles with help from my family, FNU and my friends. I hope my story inspires my younger sister and those who are from low-income earning families."

"I am looking forward to my practical attachment because it will give me a hands-on experience of what it is like to be an educator."

The Rotuma lad said that he hoped to see more young people pursue teaching in the future.

"I want to encourage other young people, especially men, to take up the challenge and join the teaching profession."

to Introduce 8 New Programmes in 2024

The Fiji National University's Ba Campus will be introducing a total of eight new programmes from Semester 1,

The eight new programmes range from various courses such as Agriculture

The courses will allow interested students to become future employees at a call centre, an office assistant, a clerical officer, front office employee, a customs officer, an employee at the Fiji Revenue and Customs Service or even a field and forest officer.

The courses and Minimum Entry Requirements (MER) include;

- Certificate in Contact Centre Operations (Call Center) requires a completion of Year 11 studies.
- Certificate in Office Assistant (Level 3) requires a completion of Year 11 studies.
- Certificate in Agriculture (Level 3) requires a completion of Year 11 studies.
- Certificate Administration (Level 4) requires a completion of Year 12 studies and 50 per cent in English.
- Certificate in Customs (Level 4) requires a completion of Year 12 studies and 50 per cent in English

• Diploma in Office Administration (Level 5) requires complet of Year 12 and 50 per cent in English. completion

• Diploma in Customs (Level 5) which requires a completion of Year 12 studies and 50 per cent in English and Diploma in Forestry (Level 5) which requires a completion of Year 12 studies and 50 per cent in English and Mathematics.

FNU's Ba Head of Campus, Niraj Dharmendra said the introduction of the new programmes was due to the high demand from residents in the Ba, Tavua and Rakiraki areas.

"Ba Campus will benefit from this by increasing its student numbers and we will ensure our campus facilities and services are enhanced to cater to all our students," he said.

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Bulai inspired by mother's nursing career

Inspired by her mother's struggles and humble beginnings, Inise Bulai is now following in her mother's footsteps by pursuing a Bachelor of Nursing at the Fiji National University's (FNU), College of Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences (CMNHS).

The 21-year-old (pictured right) proudly shared that her mother was her source of inspiration.

"She was just a village girl in the islands, and she would always tell us that she was not as bright as some of the students in her class," Bulai shared.

"She has always said that she didn't think that she was going to make it big in life and was going to be content with whatever work was given to her. However, due to hard work and perseverance, she was able to attain her Diploma in Nursing at the former Fiji School of Nursing (which is now part of CMNHS)."

The first-year student added that her mother continued to strive for higher education by graduating with her degree from James Cook University and returning to FNU to complete her postgraduate studies.

"She is the first person to be a nurse in the whole of the Yasawa Group and is currently the Director of Nursing for Aspen Medical Lautoka and Ba," she said

"From walking to school with a plastic bag to carrying her books to running hospitals, I am amazed and in awe when reflecting on how far my mother has come in life. This included the struggles and challenges she went through just to provide a better life for me and my siblings."

Bulai added that her mother always inspired her to do better and strive towards achieving her goals.

"She always told me to work hard and be better than her, live a better life and learn new things that will help me in my career. She is my role model, my life coach, my therapist, my counsellor, my helper, my source of strength and my best friend," added the Rewa native.

"I would not have the courage to take up nursing if it wasn't for her."

Bulai said that seeing nurses like her mother going out of their way to attend and provide clinics and services to villagers living in the highlands and in the islands motivated her to pursue studies in this

Nine talented scholars participated in the University's Three-Minute Thesis competition (3MTC) hosted by the Research Office last month.

The finalists from the university's five colleges not only showcased the depth of research within the institution but also underscored the dynamic range of research pursuits across various disciplines.

Professor Paul Iji, the Acting Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Research & Innovation) at FNU, emphasised the benefits of the 3MTC during the event.

"The competition allows contestants to simplify their research for the public, helping researchers understand their project plans and potential outcomes," Professor Iji said.

"A distinguished panel of judges, composed of

FNU staff and partners from the Pacific and Australia, evaluated the compelling presentations. Led by Pro-Vice-Chancellor Learning & Teaching Dr Jimaima Lako, the panel included Dr Avanish Shukla, the Associate Dean of Research of the College of Business, Hospitality and Tourism Studies (CBHTS); Dr Mark Ero from the Pacific Community (SPC), and Dr Bree Wilson from the University of the Sunshine Coast.'

Professor Iji described the competition as intense, with participants skillfully explaining their extensive research through engaging three-minute presentations.
