“The programme underscores the critical role of leadership in bridging global commitments with national priorities. It recognises that the successful realisation of the SDGs depends not only on policy frameworks, but on the capability of leaders to drive innovation and coordination, foster resilience, and ensure implementation delivers real impact across sectors,” he said.

Shaping Tomorrow’s Leaders

He also acknowledged FNU for its critical role in strengthening national leadership capability.

“The University contributes meaningfully to bridging the interface between theory and practice, ensuring that leadership development is both grounded and relevant to the realities of governance. This approach strengthens the capability of public institutions by fostering a more considered, evidence-based, and outcomes-oriented leadership culture.”

FNU Vice-Chancellor Professor Unaisi Nabobo-Baba said leadership is defined

The Fiji National University has made history as the first tertiary institution to visit Wainikeli Junior Secondary School, a newly established school in Qeleni village, Taveuni.

This milestone coincided with the official launch of FNU’s 2026 Student Liaison Outreach Programme on the Garden Island in May.

Wainikeli School, founded last year, enrolls 21 students in Years 9 and 10.

School Principal Mr Eneriko Qalica expressed his pride: “We are immensely proud that FNU reached our doorstep first. Their visit has ignited hope among our students, many of whom come from farming backgrounds.”

During the outreach, students were introduced to a broad range of programmes

available at FNU and the prospects available after secondary education.

“Until now, most of our students only envisioned farming as their future. Thanks to FNU, they now see further education as an attainable and exciting pathway,” Mr Qalica shared.

He also emphasised the importance of awareness about Technical and Vocational, Education and Training (TVET) programmes.

For many students in remote communities, tertiary education can often seem like a distant dream. However, FNU’s Student Liaison Outreach Programme at Kavanagasau College in Sigatoka has changed that perception for many students, including the school’s Head Girl, Asenaca Vunilasi, and Head Boy, Josefa Ulago. Vunilasi described the session as a life-changing experience that opened the eyes of many students who previously believed that pursuing tertiary education was beyond their reach. “Many of us come from rural backgrounds where opportunities can sometimes feel limited. Before this session, some students thought that university was only for people living in towns and cities. FNU showed us that our dreams are valid and achievable regardless of where we come from,” she said. “The information shared gave us confidence and hope. It reminded us that education is a pathway to a better future, and that with determination and hard work, we can achieve

our goals.” For Ulago, the visit was a source of motivation that encouraged students to think beyond the boundaries of their communities. “The FNU team inspired us to believe in ourselves and to look beyond what we see every day. They showed us that our future is not limited by where we live, but by how willing we are to work towards our dreams,” he said. “Many students leave school without knowing what opportunities are available to them. This visit helped us see the bigger picture and encouraged us to aim higher. It has empowered us to think about careers and possibilities we may never have considered before.” Ulago added that the outreach programme had given students a renewed sense of purpose and determination. “We are grateful that FNU travelled all the way to our school to meet us. Their visit has planted a seed of hope in many students. It has reminded us that success is possible and that our journey does not have to end in our communities.”

The Fiji National University (FNU) has concluded the first phase of its annual Student Liaison Outreach Programme, visiting secondary schools across the Western Division, as well as schools in Ovalau and Taveuni. Having visited 48 secondary schools throughout the Western Division, FNU is grateful for the opportunity to engage with students in Sigatoka, Nadi, Lautoka, Ba, Tavua and Rakiraki. FNU also extends its appreciation to the students and teachers of secondary schools in Ovalau and Taveuni for providing a valuable platform to share information on the diverse career pathways available to future students. Principal of Nakorotubu Secondary School, Sakiusa Taginisedrau, whose school is nestled in the

interior of Ra, expressed his appreciation to FNU for travelling to the remote parts of the province to engage with students and provide guidance on the various Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) and higher education pathways available at the University. Taginisedrau, who hails from Nabukadra Village in Nakorotubu, Ra, said FNU offered practical opportunities that aligned well with the aspirations and circumstances of students in rural communities. “FNU is an ideal choice for our students because we are located in a rural and coastal area of Ra, and the programmes offered by FNU suit our students very well. We can clearly see that the interest is there,” he said. “Our students have greatly benefited from the knowledge shared. This visit is more impactful than other campaigns because students are able to sit, listen attentively and gain a detailed understanding of the opportunities available to them.”

Meanwhile, in the Mamanuca Group of Islands, Malolo Island is home to Ratu Lalabalavu Secondary School. Year 12 student and Head Boy, Jonetani Radomole, said the visit by the FNU team reassured students that their dreams and aspirations were just as important as those of students attending schools in urban areas. He said living in a remote location no longer made students feel left behind, as the outreach programme brought valuable information and opportunities directly to their doorstep. “This visit has helped many of us. Before, some students were unsure about what to do after high school. Now, we have a better understanding of the programmes available and the goals we want to achieve,” he said. “I want to go to university after I finish high school and return to help my community. I hope that through education, I can make a positive difference for my people in the future.” Meanwhile, the outreach programme will conclude in the Central Division later this month before heading North.

At 5.30am, Adi Makereta Wati Malani begins her morning routine. She prepares her school uniform and packs her lunch before waiting for her transport, which arrives at 6.00am, journeying to school for nearly two hours. There is only one mode of transportation in her village of Nabukadra in Nakorotubu, Ra – a carrier which transports students from 10 surrounding villages to Nakorotubu Secondary School. Located in the most interior parts in the heart of Ra, the school is home to 120 students from Year 9 to Year

13. It offers vocational programmes in Agriculture under the Ministry of Education, providing students with valuable practical skills and career pathways. A team from the Fiji National University (FNU) was fortunate to speak with these students providing career pathways during its annual Student Liaison Outreach Programme. For 18-year-old Malani, being the Head Girl is an added responsibility which she does not carry lightly,

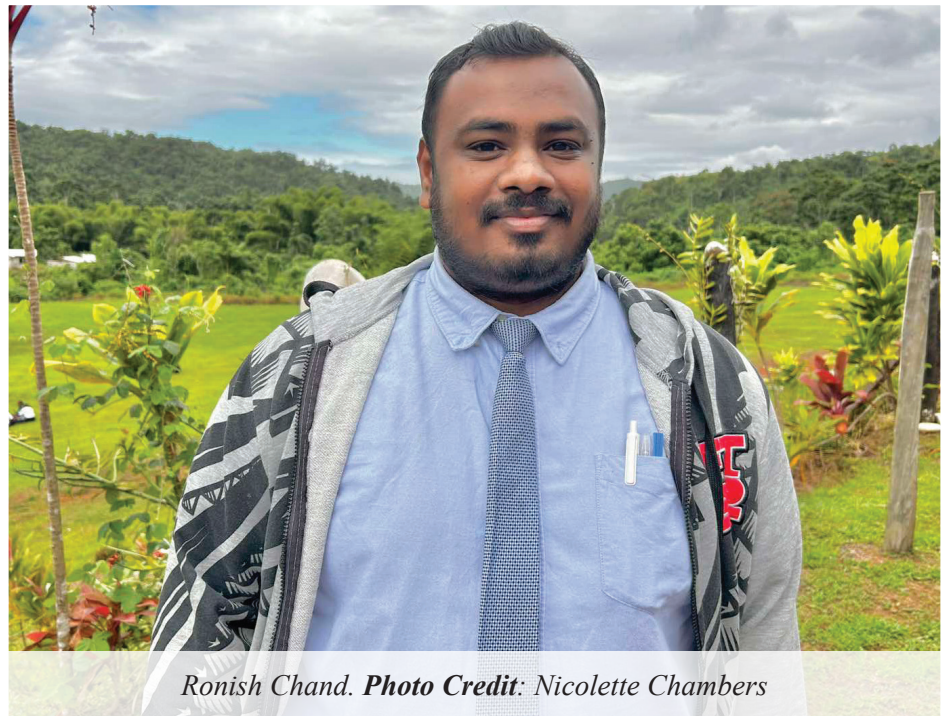
Today, Nasau Central Secondary School serves students from 14 surrounding villages, providing access to education for young people living in some of the more remote parts of Ra.

He added that three years ago, through God’s grace, the school was able to secure a 100 per cent pass through the Year 13s.

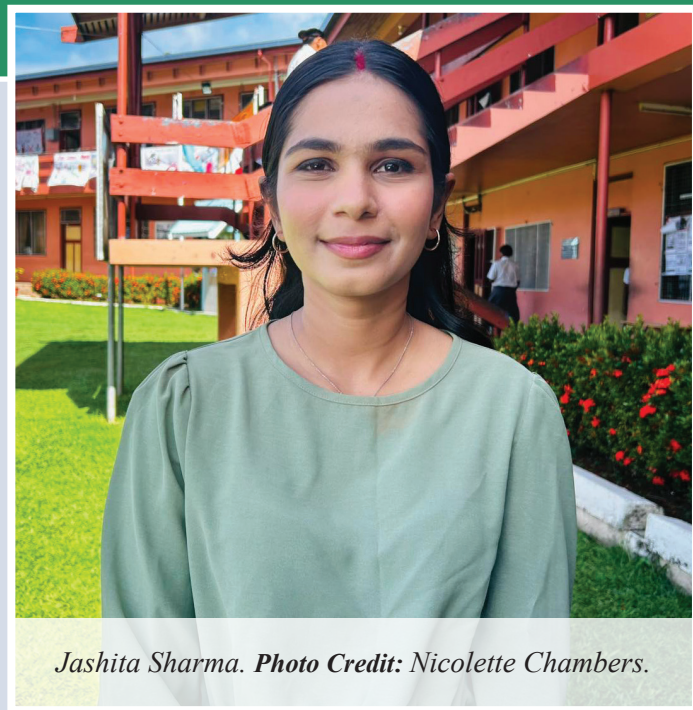

A mini summit hosted by the Fiji National University (FNU) this month has laid the foundation for stronger collaboration in maritime education, workforce development and industry-aligned training following the visit of the California Polytechnic State University (Cal Poly) Training Ship Golden Bear to Fiji.

The summit brought together representatives from FNU, Cal Poly, FIJI Water, Neptune Pacific, the Ministry of National Planning, the Maritime Safety Authority of Fiji (MSAF) and the United States Embassy to discuss opportunities for strengthening Fiji’s maritime training sector.

The meeting built on relationships established during the FIJI Water and Neptune Pacific Career Centre Summit held in California last year, where delegates from FIJI Water, Neptune Pacific and FNU visited Cal Poly to explore opportunities for international engagement, industry collaboration and skills development.

Discussions focused on enhancing

maritime training in Fiji through potential train-the-trainer initiatives, cadet pathways, international exposure opportunities and better alignment of local training programmes with international industry standards.

FNU Vice-Chancellor Professor Unaisi Nabobo-Baba said meaningful partnerships between education providers, industry, government and international institutions were essential to developing a skilled workforce that meets Fiji’s current and future needs.

“We acknowledge the contribution of all key stakeholders in supporting this important dialogue. Partnerships between education, industry, government and international institutions are critical to ensuring Fiji’s training programmes continue to respond to the needs of our people, our industries and our national development priorities,” Professor Nabobo-Baba said.

The outcomes of the summit will help shape ongoing discussions between the Career Centre, Cal Poly, FNU, government agencies and industry partners, with several priority areas identified for future collaboration.

Director of the Career Centre, Carol Watkins, said the partnership was born

out of a shared recognition of the need to bridge the gap between industry requirements and workforce capabilities.

“Through our stakeholder partnerships and discussions, we identified a gap between the skills being developed and the skills required in practice, particularly within the manufacturing and maritime sectors. That is why last year an MOA was signed between FIJI Water, Fiji National University and Neptune Pacific to establish a \$14 million Career Centre. The Centre was created as a solution to strengthen industry-aligned skills training and workforce development in Fiji,” Ms Watkins said.

She said the Career Centre had already commenced delivering programmes in manufacturing fundamentals, maritime safety and forklift operations, with

a target of training more than 300 employees by the end of the year.

“This year is focused on building strong foundations. In 2027, the Career Centre will transition into an institutionalised national model delivered through FNU, and by 2028 our aim is to offer internationally recognised certification,” she added.

Cal Poly Professor Dawn Neill said the summit demonstrated a shared commitment to strengthening maritime education and creating practical pathways into employment.

“This collaboration is about stewardship, partnership and building long-term capability. We look forward to continuing discussions on how we can work together to innovate programmes, review training pathways, connect learning to employment opportunities, build capacity and support practical, phased industry engagement,” Professor Neill said.

The mini summit reinforced the shared commitment of all partners to advancing maritime training, supporting workforce development and creating sustainable career pathways that respond to the evolving needs of Fiji’s maritime and manufacturing industries.
