## 143 graduate from FNU's College of Humanities and Education

These were the comments made by the chief guest, Permanent Secretary for Ministry of Education, Heritage and Arts, Alison Burchell at Fiji National University's (FNU) College of Humanities and Education (CHE) graduation ceremony held at the FMF Gymnasium on Friday afternoon.

Burchell urged the 143 graduates to be empathetic, creative thinkers and innovators.

"We are looking for people with excellence, aspirations, goals and targets that are achievable."

"I want to encourage you that when you go out into employment – fight against your comfort zones. It is far challenging yet interesting to continuously progress with qualifications and skills."

Burchell challenged the teacher graduates to change the methodology to teaching according to the needs of the individual students.

"We want student-centered teaching and learning. We need to treat people with dignity and understand the physical, auditory or the visual disability and make sure that we are catering for all Fijians," said PS Burchell.

"We need to ensure that our classrooms are inclusive and safe so everyone feels valued in our education system. We need to show empathy and not sympathy."

"We want to make sure that we have an ethos in our schooling system of continuous professional development. We talk too gullibly of life-long education but we don't actually make any commitment ourselves to lifelong education."

"Succeeding in the years ahead will require you to be adaptable, open to change and prepared to return to university from time to time to upgrade your skills and qualifications," said Professor Healey.

"You are on the brink of the next stage of your lives. You live in exciting times. During your working lives, the world will change in ways that we cannot yet envisage."

"We have given you the skills, competencies and mindset to get started with your career – or reskill you for a new career – and we are confident that you will have a flying start," added VC Healey.

Prasad's family travelled from Korovatu, Labasa to attend his graduation ceremony.

He has been in the teaching field for the past five years and is currently teaching at Khamendra Central School in Savusavu.
