Chand said she received a lot of encouragement and support from her employer. She looks forward to starting tertiary studies this semester.

"Human Resources is an interesting profession because it deals with people and issues related to people and I like handling these matters," she said.

"I joined A-Plus Construction in 2012 and was the only female in the organisation. I worked hard to get to where I'm today. I'm confident of doing well in my studies."
