"Say yes to career opportunities, even though you are seven months into your first pregnancy. Remind yourself that a working mother is acceptable and manageable," Narayan said.

FNU Vice-Chancellor, Professor Nigel Healey congratulated the students and said today's event was a culmination of their sacrifices, late nights, perseverance and the will to succeed.

"During the course of your journey, you have acquired technical skills and competencies, theoretical knowledge and the transferrable soft skills like team-working, independent thinking and leadership that will allow you to make a full contribution to your chosen field," Professor Healey said.
